<p>Maths</p> <p>This week we are revising last term's learning of comparing numbers to 5 (or more), identifying which of 3 sets has most/ fewest and exploring number bonds of 4 and 5.</p>	<p>Domino compare:</p> <p>If you don't have a set of dominoes you could print off the dominoes at the bottom of the page or even make your own.</p> <p>Choose a domino. How many spots are on each side? Which side shows more/ fewer spots? Can you find a domino that has equal spots?</p> 	<p>Pebble Towers:</p> <p>Collect together some pebbles that can be stacked on top of each other to create towers. If you don't have pebbles you could find an alternative such as rolled up socks.</p> <p>Now you need 2 team mates to play with. Each player builds a tower of pebbles. Compare towers- who has built the tallest tower? Whose tower has more pebbles/ fewest pebbles? If you added one more pebble to your tower- how many pebbles would there be?</p> 	<p>5 Little Speckled Frogs.</p> <p>Sing the song together. https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=oYX1OaiVR94</p> <p>Now create your own pool with log and 5 frogs. Use the pics at the bottom of the page or get creative (blue material for a pool, twigs to make a log and playdough for the frogs).</p> <p>At the beginning of the song there are 5 frogs on the log and 0 frogs in the pool.</p> <p>There are 5 frogs altogether. 5 and $0 = 5$.</p> <p>Now sing the song again. Stop when one frog jumps in the pool. Look at how many frogs are on the log and how many are in the pool. Remember, there are still 5 frogs altogether. 4 and $1 = 5$</p> <p>Continue the song. Each time a frog jumps in the pool look at the number of frogs on the log and in the pool. Record the numbers you find. Can you see any patterns in the numbers you find?</p> 
<p>Literacy/topic</p> <p>This week we are exploring the season of Winter.</p>	<p>Can you learn this Winter rhyme to perform to your family? Why not add some actions to help you remember the words. Don't forget to use your loud, clear voice!</p> <p>The North wind doth blow And we shall have snow And what will poor robin do then poor thing? He'll sit in a barn To keep himself warm And hide his head under his wing. Poor thing.</p> 	<p>Watch the snow falling in this YouTube video. https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=JN7H4jshHxs</p>  <p>Can you become a snowflake?</p> <p>Use your body to create the movements you have seen- swirl, twirl, float, twist and fall gently to the music</p>  <p>What other words can you think of that describe the snowflakes as they fall? Ask a grown-up to collect your words and write them down for you.</p> <p>Here are a few to get started... Soft, white, gentle, frosty, shimmer, glisten, sparkle, turn.</p>	<p>Snowflake shape poem.</p> <p>Did you know that every single snowflake is different?</p>  <p>Snowflakes have 6 'arms'.</p> <p>You could make your own paper snowflakes by following the instructions from the Learn English Kids website- find them at the bottom of the page or get crafty and create snowflakes with paper plates or with lolly sticks...</p>  <p>Use one of the snowflakes you have made to create a snowflake shape poem. Add your favourite describing words to the arms of your snowflake.</p> <p>Here are the words I chose for my snowflake:</p>













Some birds fly away (migrate) to warmer countries before Winter comes because there will be less food for them if they stay here. But, there are still lots of birds that do stay in our country.


We can help them by providing them with food and water. Why not make some yummy treats to feed the birds with?
