Talk to your grown up:
What did you notice about the words?



They are all things you can do.



These 'doing' words are called verbs. They describe an action.

Can you think of any more 'doing' words?
Act out the action and see if your grown up can guess the word.





How does adding -ing change the words?

It tells us the action is happening now.

Tell your grown up what you are doing right now.



Now we are going to talk about two special words you need to try to remember!

These are:

Root word and suffix.

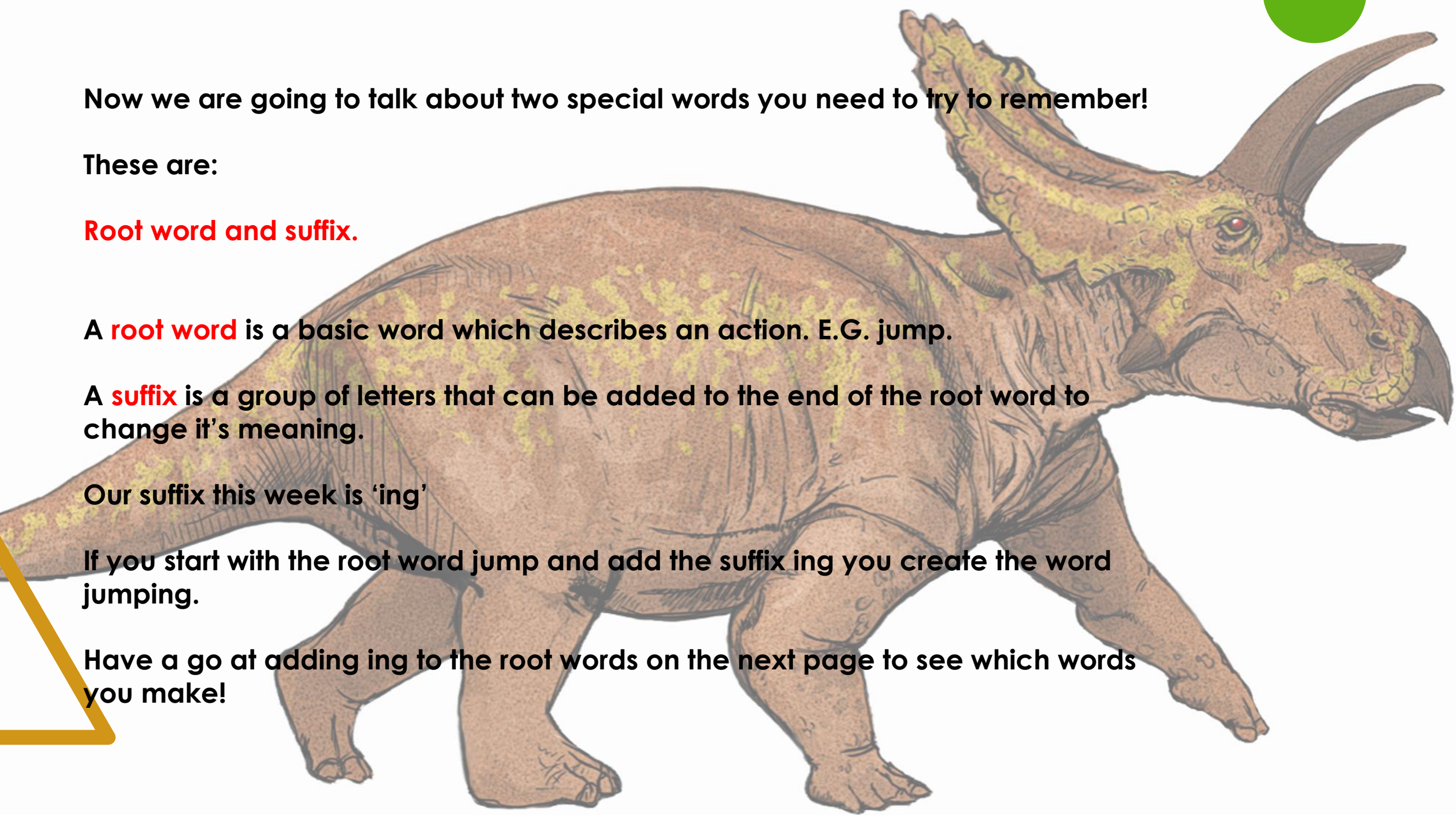
A **root word** is a basic word which describes an action. E.G. jump.

A **suffix** is a group of letters that can be added to the end of the root word to change it's meaning.

Our suffix this week is 'ing'

If you start with the root word jump and add the suffix ing you create the word jumping.

Have a go at adding ing to the root words on the next page to see which words you make!

catch

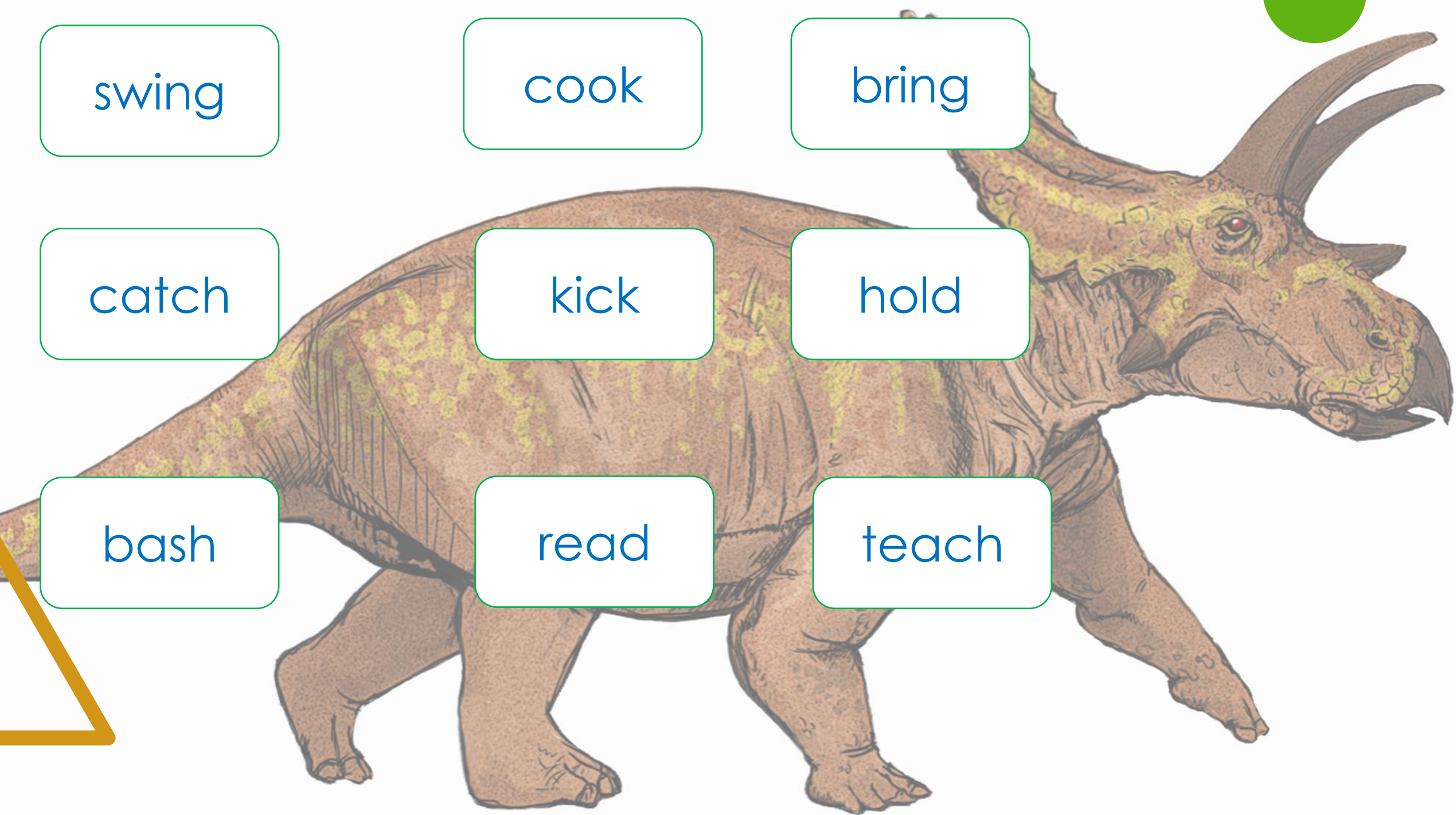
