# Privacy notice for pupils

You have a legal right to be informed about how our school uses any personal information that we hold about you. To comply with this, we provide a 'privacy notice' to you where we are processing your personal data.

This privacy notice explains how we collect, store and use personal data about you.

We, All Souls' c of E Primary School, Stanley Road, Folkestone, Kent. Ct19 4LG, are the 'data controller' for the purposes of data protection law.

Our data protection officer is Tracey Howard

## The personal data we hold

We hold some personal information about you to make sure we can help you learn and look after you at school.

For the same reasons, we get information about you from some other places too – like other schools, the local council and the government.

This information includes:

- Your contact details
- Your test results
- Your attendance records
- Your characteristics, like your ethnic background or any special educational needs
- Any medical conditions you have
- Details of any behaviour issues or exclusions
- Photographs
- CCTV images

## Why we use this data

We use this data to help run the school, including to:

- Get in touch with you and your parents when we need to
- Check how you're doing in exams and work out whether you or your teachers need any extra help
- Track how well the school as a whole is performing

Look after your wellbeing

## Our legal basis for using this data

We will only collect and use your information when the law allows us to. Most often, we will use your information where:

- We need to comply with the law
- We need to use it to carry out a task in the public interest (in order to provide you with an education)

Sometimes, we may also use your personal information where:

- You, or your parents/carers have given us permission to use it in a certain way
- We need to protect your interests (or someone else's interest)

Where we have got permission to use your data, you or your parents/carers may withdraw this at any time. We will make this clear when we ask for permission, and explain how to go about withdrawing consent.

Some of the reasons listed above for collecting and using your information overlap, and there may be several grounds which mean we can use your data.

## Collecting this information

While in most cases you, or your parents/carers, must provide the personal information we need to collect, there are some occasions when you can choose whether or not to provide the data.

We will always tell you if it's optional. If you must provide the data, we will explain what might happen if you don't.

## How we store this data

We will keep personal information about you while you are a pupil at our school. We may also keep it after you have left the school, where we are required to by law.

Our record retention schedule/records management policy sets out how long we keep information about pupils.

## Data sharing

We do not share personal information about you with anyone outside the school without permission from you or your parents/carers, unless the law and our policies allow us to do so.

Where it is legally required, or necessary for another reason allowed under data protection law, we may share personal information about you with:

- *Our local authority – to meet our legal duties to share certain information with it, such as concerns about pupils' safety and exclusions*
- *The Department for Education (a government department) – to meet our legal obligations to share certain information with it, such as test results and admissions*
- *Your family and representatives – to contact in your well-being, emergency, exclusion, school life*
- *Educators and examining bodies – to meet our legal duties to share certain information with it, such as safeguarding, testing – to meet our legal duties*
- *Our regulator – Ofsted – to meet legal obligations to provide information about pupils' data and school life*
- *Suppliers and service providers – so that they can provide the services we have contracted them for*
- *Financial organisations – so they can provide the services we have contracted them for*
- *Central and local government – to meet our legal duties for testing and concerns such as pupils' safety*
- *Our auditors – so they can provide the service we have contracted them for*
- *Survey and research organisations*
- *Health authorities – to meet our legal duties to share certain information with such as height and weight programme and flue immunisations*
- *Security organisations – we do not share information with these organisations*
- *Health and social welfare organisations – to meet our legal duties to share certain information such as concerns about pupils' safety and exclusions*
- *Professional advisers and consultants – so they can provide the service they have been contracted for*
- *Charities and voluntary organisations – we do not share information with these organisations*
- *Police forces, courts, tribunals – to meet legal duties to share certain information with it, such as concerns about pupils' safety, well-being.*
- *Professional bodies – to meet legal duties to share certain information with it, such as concerns for pupils' well-being.*

## National Pupil Database

We are required to provide information about you to the Department for Education (a government department) as part of data collections such as the school census.

Some of this information is then stored in the [National Pupil Database](#), which is managed by the Department for Education and provides evidence on how schools are performing. This, in turn, supports research.

The database is held electronically so it can easily be turned into statistics. The information it holds is collected securely from schools, local authorities, exam boards and others.

The Department for Education may share information from the database with other organisations which promote children's education or wellbeing in England. These organisations must agree to strict terms and conditions about how they will use your data.
