









'Fantasy and Fairy Tales' Topic Home Learning

	Knowledge	Understanding	Applying our knowledge and understanding
Creative learning	<p>How many different trees can you identify? Gather some pictures of different trees and stick them in your home learning book. Find out the name of the tree and add labels to your pictures.</p> 	<p>Plant some seeds. (cress grows quickly!) Take a picture of you planting the seeds and record the changes that happen over the next few days / weeks.</p> 	<p>Make a miniature home or garden for a fairy or a pixie from natural materials such as bark, pebbles, leaves and twigs. There are lots of ideas to inspire you on the internet.</p> 
Verbal learning	<p>Go and visit a local wood. (for example Reindeen Woods in Hawkinge, Lyminge Forest) Take some pictures of your visit and stick them in your home learning book. Write a list of 10 things that you found.</p> 	<p>Have fun building a den with your family or friends. Draw or take a picture of you all in your den. Write a set of instructions about how you made your den.</p> 	<p>Write a 'Who am I?' riddle about a fairy tale character. Remember to include lots of adjectives so that we can guess which character it is.</p> 
Finding out	<p>Are all forests the same? Find out about a forest in another country. Make a fact page or poster about it.</p> 	<p>Visit the local library and see how many fairy tales you can find. Which is your favourite? Take a picture of you reading your favourite fairy tale in the library and stick it in your book.</p> 	<p>Create a tally chart or pictogram of the different birds that you find in your garden. Which ones are the most common? Do you have any rare birds visit your garden?</p>
